will celebrate and honor our Veterans with an exciting program, evening meal and fellowship on the Sunday prior to Veterans Day. You may even have gatherings with loved ones here at WAL to enjoy a delicious turkey meal for Thanksgiving. These celebrations tend to create both traf-

fic jams at the front gate and parking challenges, so please inform Gate Communications prior to your guest's arrival to expedite entry onto the property. This is also a great time to use your

garage parking spaces if you have one, as it alleviates the challenges some have when attempting to find a general use parking space.

Approved Contracts

The Board of Directors recently approved nine contracts after they went through both the Budget Committee and the respective committee responsible for overseeing such areas. These contracts will keep our buildings and amenities available for use and help maintain the buildings and grounds. Here are a few contracts that I want to specifically emphasize to the community:

Elevator Machine Motor Replacement

Schindler Elevator Corporation will replace the original equipment installed during Building (Bldg.) 4's original construction as a part of a \$232,493 contract. Residents in Bldg. 4 will have one elevator out of service at a time while this work is in progress.

Trash Contract

Five trash companies were requested to bid on our trash removal services and three submitted bids. The Board selected American Disposal, the lowest bidder. This three-year contract is for \$423,999.84.

Each owner pays about \$9 per month for trash pickup. Increases are possible based on disposal rate increases imposed by the disposal facility. Weekly required tasks include five trash pickups in all the buildings and three pickups for bulk items.

Construction Documents for the Multi-Use Area

A contract for \$14,600 was awarded to Studio 39 to develop design plans that can be used as a part of a request for proposals and to determine the project costs.

Upper Terrace Stairwell Flood Prevention and Stairwell Renovation Project

WAL awarded a \$58,000 contract to EV Air Tight, the lowest bidder out of three companies who submitted proposals. This contract work will mitigate the water intrusion

in the outside stairwell that leads from the Upper Terrace into the Bldg. 2 garage and the Community Center.

Committee Updates

The Board approved FY2020 membership for two bylawrequired committees, Budget and Covenants. The Association is fortunate to have volunteers to serve on these two important committees, and membership is restricted per our bylaws.

Six highly-qualified people applied to be a part of the Covenants Committee in September but the bylaws restrict membership to five owners. It was a tough decision for the Board to have to inform a willing volunteer that the maximum was reached for the Covenants Committee. Unfortunately, the Board-selected chairperson (Ray Foote) resigned from the committee in October. During the October Board Meeting, a new chairperson and another member to the committee will be appointed.

Our Budget Committee is currently under the bylaw limits, even though the Board appointed ten highly-qualified resident owners. Consider submitting your name to be appointed to the Budget Committee, as it is an opportunity for owners to contribute to the budget process.

Remember, we will not have a Board Meeting in November. So, have a great Thanksgiving and I'll see you in December!

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PROCESS TO RUN FOR THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS

The 43rd Annual Meeting of the Watergate at Landmark Condominium Unit Owners Association will be held on Monday, March 2, 2020. There are four positions on the Board of Directors to be filled at the 43rd Annual Meeting. At that meeting, four candidates with the highest percentage of votes will be elected to three-year terms on the Board of Directors. Any qualified resident may run for a position.

How Do I Become a Candidate?

<u>Pick up and complete an official</u> <u>nominating petition</u> from the Resident Services Office located in the Community Center. Petitions must include your name, building and unit number, phone number and your signature. Your petition must be endorsed by at least 10 unit owners. We encourage you to obtain more signa-

The Annual Meeting and Elections will be held in the Terrace Lounge/ Town Square.


The winner of the "super" door prize, generously donated by Susan Day, was none other than the Secretary of the Association, Vivian Moran!

THERE'S A DROUGHT GOING ON? OVERCOMING OUR COMMUNITY'S LANDSCAPE CHALLENGES

This past year has been a challenging one for the Landscape Committee.

Following nearly 18 months of unprecedented rainfall, the entire mid-Atlantic area entered into a severe and protracted drought beginning the first week of July of this year. From that time until October 10, barely an inch of rainfall was recorded at Reagan National Airport. Thankfully we received about four inches of rain since then, which helped to reduce the drought's effects.

Thus, the Landscape Committee confronted two very different and difficult sets of challenges, each with its own peculiar impacts on our community and landscape. such as English Ivy, succumbed to the relentless rain and water. So, too, did a number of magnificent, mature trees, some original to the property when it was developed in the mid-1970s. The preponderance of damage was concentrated in front of Building 1 along the fence line on Yoa-kum Parkway, but by no means limited to that area.

Recognizing that the committee needed to reconstitute the tree line at the front of the property, which by this time had been significantly degraded, it looked to varieties of trees that were more adaptable to a changing and wetter climate. Nothing seemed more obvious and appropriate than the "swamp white oak," which had a number of interesting virtues, including its absence from the existing in-

Center. Combined with extreme heat and humidity, it contributed to the growth of mold in a number of WAL units, imposing considerable hardship and expense on the Association and individual homeowners to remediate.

The rains also saturated the landscape to a degree that a number of lower-lying areas could no longer accommodate or purge the excess water. What resulted was an accumulation of water that remained in place for weeks and rotted out the root systems of a large number of trees, shrubs and other plants, including the vines that comprise the major part of the hedge at the front entrance to our property. Plants considered virtually indestructible, the swamp white oak. So much for thoughtful deliberation and decision-making.

Which sort of brings me to the second element of the committee's challenge this year, and that has to do with how do we manage and ameliorate the effects of what is now an extended drought. Cactus and tumbleweed, anyone?

The Landscape Committee meets the second Wednesday of each month at 11:00 AM in Meeting Room 2. If you have a passion for gardening and a love of landscape, we welcome your participation on the committee.

DOWN MEMORY LANE THE "FLAME" PRESIDENT KENNEDY LIT

Accomplished journalist and lawyer Irene Mields shares her memories below regarding the 35th President's tenure shaped her life along with happened 56 years ago on November 22, 1963—the day his untimely passing.

The scene in our den was undoubtedly like that of thousands across the Washington, DC area and nation. The grandparents were in town for Thanksgiving. My four children, home on vacation, clustered around their grandparents in front of the TV. Hugh, my husband, took a few days off from work as the Assistant Director for Legislation at the American Municipal Association. I was still a "homemaker"—not yet a returnee to journalism nor a novice in my second career as a lawyer. We were all together, therefore, when the shocking news came. Even the children, aged five to 11 at the time, understood the seriousness of the moment.

I don't remember if we saw the assassination live or the TV reports that followed. I do remember how the tragedy dominated every waking moment of our lives for months. From time to time, I see "reruns" in my mind...the instant collapse of President Kennedy and the First Lady, climbing in desperation toward the rear of the open limousine.

Thankfully, I could reflect on a happier time.

I remember the "Camelot" aspects of his short Presidency in greater detail than the senseless act that took his life. By Washington standards at the time, Hugh and I were "young," relative newcomers from the Midwest. Our toes were in the "power circles" but weren't making heavy footprints that would leave lasting remarks. That would come later.

Influence in the power circles doesn't always equal affluence in the early stages, so we had mixed feelings when we received an invitation to the Inaugural Ball. Although Hugh and I were invited, we did not have the attire for such an occasion. No formal gown, no tuxedo, no fur coat, no fabulous jewels. We wondered how we would ever afford to attend. We had mortgage payments for our recently -purchased townhouse. There were also the costs of raising four children.

Our neighbors, the Morgensteins, came to the rescue in part. Mrs. Morgenstein's beautiful brown silk ribbon dress fit me perfectly, as did her fur shawl. The rental fees for

Hugh's tux were reasonable. We went in style to the preball cocktail party given by Patrick Healy, Executive Director of the American Municipal Association at the time. With our good friends Will and Barbara Smith, we waded through the unusual snow storm which threatened to dampen the opening of "Camelot." With them, we gawked when the President and First Lady arrived, looking as handsome, beautiful and glamorous as the pictures portrayed them. Will, Barbara, Hugh and I finished the evening in an all-night diner at 3 a.m., reflecting on the road that brought us all to Washington and the country that elected a President with such promise.

Hugh took the children to the Inauguration despite the inclement weather. They were too young, I suppose, to understand Kennedy's admonition to "Ask not what your country can do for you but ask what you can do for your country." This is something that Hugh and I took seriously and others did as well in his or her own way.

We went on to support key legislation from that time, which included the Civil Rights Act and anti-poverty programs. In some cases, we were able to leave our "footprints" of influence. Hugh went on to initiate or have a strong role in such legislation as Housing Acts and the first water and air pollution statutes. I had similar opportunities to work on legislation like the Air Carrier Access Act, the Americans with Disabilities Act and a statute to ensure the participation of women and minorities in concessions at airports.

I'm reminded of the eternal flame that burns on President Kennedy's grave, but that is only one of the many "flames" he lit in those who heard his words.

I heard the distant bugle, and it brought me crushing pain, for I knew that with the fading notes that a part of me was slain. I took his fallen rifle and with a scream for hell I drove it deep in mother earth To mark the place he fell.

I raised my fist to Heaven and screamed to God on high Why do You take this soldier; why do You let him die?

And it seemed that as I stood there in the blood red sky of dawn that the answer came from Heaven, "Do you think your comrade's gone?

He left your bloody battlefield, where men are torn apart, and as you scream in anger he's in my sacred heart.




